### Sources for Understanding Chronology of Winter Quarters Settlements

Sept. 10, 1846

"About nine a.m., Elder Kimball and I rode out to find a location for the council to winter, and returned in the afternoon. . . . I met with Elders

Heber C. Kimball, Orson Pratt, Wilford Woodruff, Willard Richards and

the High Council at seven p.m. The committee on location recommended

to locate on both sides of Willow Creek north of the present encampment.

The Twelve agreed to walk out in the morning and select their location for the winter." (Elden J. Watson, ed., Manuscript History of Brigham Young, p. 377)

Sept. 11, 1846

". . . about 10 1/2 Young, Kimball, O. Pratt, Richards, Woodruff, Geo. A.

Smith, A. Lyman, walked north near the timber. . . . struck a stake

Sept. 16, 1846
